National Assessment Program

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assessments held earlier this year had a very high participation rate from Victorian students, with participation levels returning to pre-COVID levels.

Last month, families with children in grades 3 or 5 or years 7 or 9 who participated in the assessments received their results through an individual NAPLAN report. Today, the statewide results have been released, and I am pleased to have this opportunity to provide some information about Victoria's performance.

There are a total of 20 tests each year across grades 3 and 5 and years 7 and 9 that assess student achievement in reading, writing, numeracy, spelling, grammar and punctuation.

Of the 20 tests, Victorian was ranked first or second in 16, more than any other state or territory, and an improvement on the 2022 results when the equivalent figure was 12.

NAPLAN results for Grade 3 are of particular importance because the first 3 years of schooling establish the foundation for further success. Victorian Grade 3 students achieved the highest results in the country for both reading and numeracy.

In secondary schools, Victoria had the lowest proportion of students needing additional support in both years 7 and 9 in both reading and numeracy compared to all other states and territories.

The results have also highlighted the fact that we need to continue our efforts to close the gap between advantaged and disadvantaged students. While Aboriginal students in Victoria achieved higher results on average than in other states and territories, the gap between the performance of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students is still too large, as is the gap between the average performance of metropolitan students and that of regional students.

Overall, however, while we are clearly focused on the areas where further improvement is needed, these are excellent results. They are a tribute to the outstanding work of teachers, principals and staff in the schools across our state. No one would suggest our schools are perfect. Education is always an unfinished business. But on the evidence of today's release of the statewide NAPLAN results, Victorian teachers and school principals are doing a great job.

In Foundation we have had a super busy week! We started it off with an amazing Fire Safety session with the Fire Fighters from Highett station. They were extremely informative and the students were so engaged. We learnt to 'get down low, and GO GO GO'.

The inquisitive nature of students was shown with some thought provoking questions asked to our visitors at the end of the session.

All students will draw a picture and give it to their teacher of their safe meeting place at home if a fire were to occur. We are looking forward to our next visit where we will get to explore the fire truck and maybe even squirt the hose!

Additionally, we are LOVING our specialist subjects. There was such a buzz on filming day for our production and everyone looked fantastic. We cannot wait to watch it!





Level 1 & 2 Happenings

Welcome to week 7! We skipped a couple of years this week and gave learning a go in the Senior Learning Centre. While it was a good experience, we were happy to get back to the comfort of the JLC.

Our writing focus this week has been on Narratives and its structure, with a beginning, problem and a solution. The Level 1 Mentor Text has been 'Ceremony' by Adam Goodes and Ellie Laing.

We have been studying the different Indigenous words and their English meanings. Students have enjoyed sharing the different celebrations that they share within their own families.

Level 2's have been reading different versions of 'The Three Little Pigs' and comparing the two stories, looking for their problem and solution.

All students made an anemometer in Science last week. An anemometer is an instrument that measure wind speed. The stronger the wind blows, the faster the wheel rotates.

The anemometer counts the number of rotations, which is used to calculate wind speed. Students were really excited to come back into class and share their learning with their classroom teachers.

During Investigations we conducted a science experiment about rain clouds. The shaving cream represents the clouds and the water represents the air. The coloured water represents rain. As the coloured water saturates the "cloud", it gets heavy and eventually is so heavy that it can no longer hold the water. It "rains" down into the jar – through the "air." Pretty cool!

Although SEPS were unable to make it to the finals, we were able to observe other Bayside schools, who demonstrated exceptional debating skills.

Now, we take this learning back to the classroom to extend our existing powers of persuasion.


