The professional practice days are part of the Victorian Government Schools Agreement 2017. Each full time teacher is entitled to one day per term (four days per year), to focus on the improved delivery of high quality teaching and learning.

Look before you lock: a new campaign to highlight accidental leaving

Raising awareness of 'fatal distraction' and its role in child safety.

Accidentally leaving a child in the back seat of a car with potentially devastating consequences can happen to anyone—the only safeguard against it is to Look Before You Lock. The Department's Look Before You Lock campaign—an Australian government first—aims to raise awareness about the phenomenon of 'fatal distraction', a condition that affects our short-term memory capacity.



The condition occurs when stress, extreme exhaustion or a change in routine overloads our short-term memory system. For parents, it can result in children being unintentionally left in cars, with potentially devastating consequences.

Associate Professor Matthew Mundy, of the Monash Institute of Cognitive and Clinical Neurosciences, is Australia's leading expert in this type of memory loss. He worked closely with the Department to develop the campaign.

'Short-term memory failure, when our brains become overloaded with things to remember, can have disastrous consequences,' Dr Mundy says.

'It can cause parents and carers to accidentally leave a child in a car, which can result in serious injury or, in extreme cases, the death of a child.'

Dr Mundy, who recently became a father himself, says early childhood professionals have an important role to play in helping parents and carers understand the potential dangers.

He recommends checking in with parents or carers who seem distracted or have '... a lot on, too many tasks, trying to juggle many things at the one time,' he says.

'And try to look out for people distracted by life events because we know a change of routine can impact on short term memory — that could be changing schools or child care.'

The *Look Before You Lock* campaign aims to encourage parents and carers to develop new habits to minimise the risk, such as checking the backseat every time they get out of the car.

Mother of 12-month-old Zara, Poi Khoon Lai, recently took part in a photo shoot for the *Look Before You Lock* campaign.

'I really want people to remember to check the car before they lock, especially when they have a second baby,' she says about allowing Zara to be in the campaign.

'I have nearly forgotten Zara a couple of times — your brain doesn't work — especially with a newborn.'

Dr Stacey Gabriel, Prevention and Health Promotion Director, said the *Look Before You Lock* campaign had been developed in direct response to recommendations from the Victorian Coroner.

'Target audiences are primarily parents and caregivers of children aged 0-5, and early childhood, health, parenting support stakeholders and MCH nurses,' she says.

A fact sheet on short-term memory failure, its causes and potential consequences, and advice on

how parents and carers can minimise the risk of fatal distraction has been developed with input from Dr Mundy.

Over the next month, *Look Before You Lock* will be promoted through radio, billboard and online advertising, and public relations activities. Posters have been sent to Maternal and Child Health centres and early childhood services.

Notifications – Clarification

We have had feedback from some parents that they find the consistency of Compass communications a little confusing. We have spoken with the Compass managers and would now like to clarify a couple of things for you:

- **Notifications on the App**

You must remain signed into the Compass App to receive these notifications (not have the App open, but signed in) AND you will need to turn on notifications in the settings of your smart phone. All parents with these settings enabled will then receive 'push notifications' sent by the school (push notifications are the instant message alerts).

- **Emails via Compass**

Presently, when we send an email via Compass only Parent 'A' of a family receives the message.

In the case of students whose mum & dad live separately (and the school has been informed), Parent A of each of those families will be alerted.

Over the coming weeks we will be working on a Compass knowledge base which will be accessible from our school website to assist with the use of Compass.

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING AT SANDY EAST THIS WEEK?

FOUNDATION

In Maths we have been exploring tens and ones through memory games, sums and tens towers. We have also begun learning about graphs and how to represent class data, such as our favourite colour.

Science has seen us head out doors to discuss what we see in the sky and then record our findings through drawings and independent writing.

It has been great to hear that students have been reading their take home books each night and using their THRASS charts at home as it has given them the confidence to challenge themselves to write independently during all lessons.

The students have been looking at narratives this week and have been sharing narrative stories in class. Students have begun planning their own stories, which we cannot wait to read in the next few weeks!

Take-home books are in full swing and students should be bringing a new book home each night. It is really important that all students are reading every night!

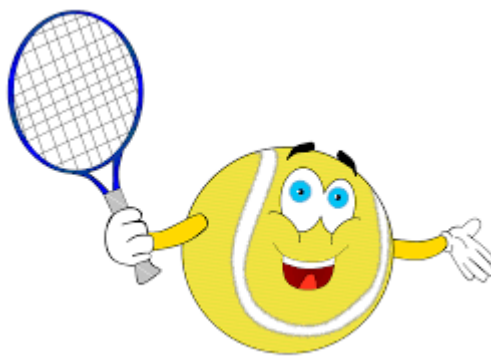
Authentic Japanese learning with our Japanese intern

Healthy Eating

Bayside Canteens believes children should be able to make choices. Whilst we sell processed foods we also provide healthy low cost alternatives that are available every day to choose from.

To help promote healthy eating choices we also implement some food preparation guidelines:

- No added salt during the cooking process
- Low fat salad dressings, mayonnaise and margarine are used.
- All sweet baked items are made fresh each day from raw ingredients, not from a packet.
- Fresh foods are priced at an appealing low cost price. For example a piece of fruit is only 50 cents, well below cost of the item to encourage children to choose a healthy option.

Bayside Canteens work within the DET Victorian Government Nutritional Guidelines. We do not offer deep fried food or high sugar foods, meaning chips and lollies are not available on our menus. Instead we offer a range of fresh, nourishing food for students to choose from, as well as some of the traditional style foods like hotdogs.

A balanced menu should provide a range of choices with a wide variety of foods. Children need to learn how to create and establish a balanced diet by being allowed to choose from fresh nutritious foods and some processed foods. If only fresh natural foods are provided and other foods forbidden evidence¹ has shown they can develop a binge attitude to processed – especially highly processed- foods
